

This term, Newstead College welcomed Tasmanian Artist in Residence (AIR) for 2015, Tricky Walsh. For the next two terms Tricky will be engaging with students while creating unique artwork. Tricky, whose interdisciplinary practice is concerned with the integration of mysticism with scientific reasoning, will bring a wealth of knowledge and skill to our already highly effective art staff.

In its sixth year, the 2015 AIR program will see eight professional artists undertaking residencies in eight schools and colleges in the public and independent sectors around the state. Working alongside year 11 and 12 students, the residencies focus on modelling to students and staff the artist's creative processes and practice. The Tasmanian AIR program has achieved national and international recognition as a successful model, offering both professional development for artists whilst contributing to the current arts learning for students and staff.



AIR 2015 is an artist in residence program developed and managed by Arts Tasmania in partnership with the Australia Council for the Arts.

The Glover Art Prize

On the 11th of March Newstead College art students, along with students from LCGS, LC, and St Patrick's, visited Evandale to view the 2015 Glover Exhibition. The Glover Prize is the richest annual prize for landscape painting in Australia. It is awarded for the work judged the best contemporary landscape painting of Tasmania. The winner receives \$40,000 and a bronze maquette of colonial artist John Glover, whose legacy is celebrated though the Prize.

Students spent time admiring works while documenting concepts and techniques which may help their own studies. Students were then given a presentation by Curator, Dr Jane Deeth, on 'The Glover', its history, the selection process and some of the challenges faced by artists and viewers. Jane's in-depth discussion about how to analyse an art work was appreciated and valued by all students.

When leaving the presentation, Jane generously donated her acclaimed book, *Looking at Landscapes*, valued at \$19.95 to every student. This will be a valuable resource for the years to come.
